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The College of Education and Social Sciences is composed of the Department of Behavioral Sciences; Division of Education; Department of History, Political Science and Criminal Justice; and Department of Sports and Exercise Sciences.

The College has a dedicated faculty, a large majority with doctorates from prominent universities throughout the country,

and more than 2,200 students in 45 major fields of study. Departments within the College of Education and Social Sciences offer undergraduate programs in athletic training, criminal justice, education, sports and exercise sciences, history, political science, pre-law, geography, public administration, psychology, sociology and social work.

The college provides a wide variety of professional preparations including criminal justice administration, public administration, sports and exercise sciences, recreation and leisure, and teacher education, along with graduate work in a number of fields of study.

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## Department of Behavioral Sciences

The Department of Behavioral Sciences includes the disciplines of psychology, sociology and social work with majors in each area. Psychology's scientific study of behavior and mental processes includes application of psychological principles to human conditions. Sociology is the systematic study of human society and the influences of social systems on human behavior. The professional program in social work prepares students in helping individuals, groups and communities enhance or restore social functioning.

Studies in behavioral sciences offer diverse perspectives to students who want to learn more about individual and group behavior. Fundamentals of the disciplines are stressed, and students learn the importance of developing problem-solving and research skills. They learn ways of relating to issues confronting individuals and society. The behavioral sciences provide relevant preparation for many different vocations. Graduate study and a career in psychology, sociology or social work also may be the ultimate objective.

## Bachelor of Arts (B.A.)/ Bachelor of Science (B.S.) Degree

### Major in Psychology (Major Code: 119)

University core curriculum requirements as outlined below in the curriculum guide for major in psychology.

#### Psychology Core Requirements

36 semester hours including PSYC 2301, 2272, 2314, 3310, 3311, 3360 or 3355, 4319, and two courses from PSYC 3350, 3320, 3430 or 3335, plus nine to 10 hours of psychology electives, nine of which must be advanced.

#### Prerequisite for Advanced Psychology Classes

PSYC 2301 is the prerequisite for all advanced (3000- and 4000-level) courses except PSYC 3310.

# Department of Behavioral Sciences

## Options in Psychology

### Option I—Professional Psychology

The Professional Psychology Option follows recommendations from nationwide graduate programs and prepares students to pursue a master's or a doctorate degree in various psychology specializations.

Recommended courses for any graduate specialization:

- BIOL 1406, 1406L and 1407, 1407L as lab science core curriculum.
- BIOL 2401, 2401L and 2402, 2402L as bachelor of science degree requirements.
- SOCI 1301 or ANTH 2351.

Additional recommended courses for clinical or counseling psychology:

- PSYC 3360, 3355, 4361, 4371, 4377 and 3350.
- SOCW 2361.
- CD 2301.

Additional recommended courses for forensic psychology:

- PSYC 3373, 3350, 3335 and 3360.
- SCOM 1321 and 3303.
- PHIL 2303.
- CRIJ 1306, 3322 and 2328.
- SOCI 3370, 3374 and 4302.

Additional recommended courses for neuroscience:

- PSYC 3320 and 4324.
- CHEM 1410, 2523, 2525.

Consult with departmental faculty for recommendations on other psychology specializations.

### Option II—General Psychology

The General Psychology Option provides a background for students whose career goals are in psychology-related fields (e.g., entering law school or the ministry) but not in becoming a psychologist.

# Department of Behavioral Sciences

## Major in Social Work (Major Code: 131)

### University Core Curriculum Requirements

(Refer to the “University Core Curriculum” section of this catalog and the “Curriculum Guide, Major in Social Work.”)

Students must take PSYC 2301, SOCI 1301, BIOL 1406 and 1407 from core curriculum requirements.

NOTE: The social work program is accredited by the Council on Social Work Education. The principal educational objective of the program is to prepare students for employment as beginning, entry-level generalist practitioners. Preparation of students for graduate education is a secondary objective. Social work majors are urged to consult closely with program advisers to assure proper sequencing of courses and in selection of appropriate electives.

### Social Work Requirements

- 46 semester hours, including SOCW 2361, 2315, 3301, 3380, 3381, 3383, 3098(6), 4310, 4121, 4341, 4362, 4098(6) and six semester hours from SOCW 4303, 4305, 4376, 4320, SOCI 4325.

### Required Courses from Other Areas

- PSYC 2301.
- SOCI 1301, 1306, 4321.
- SOCW 3362 or PSYC 3310.
- BIOL 1406, 1407.
- For other electives, students should consult faculty advisers.

### Criteria for Admission into the Social Work Program

All students registering as social work majors will be considered premajors before they are officially admitted into the social work program.

Criteria for admission into the social work program are\*:

1. Completion of the University’s core curriculum courses, including BIOL 1406 and 1407.
2. Completion of the beginning-level social work courses—SOCW 2361, 2315 and 3301. A student must have earned a grade of “C” or better in the above three courses.
3. An overall cumulative grade point of 2.25 or higher.
4. An application for admission to the social work program accompanied by (1) at least two letters of reference from people who can attest to the student’s desire and commitment to helping people, and (2) the student’s latest transcripts.
5. Filing of a degree plan with the dean of the College of Education and Social Sciences.

\*Exceptions to these criteria will be considered on an individual basis. A letter must be written explaining the request and submitted with the program application to be considered by the program committee.

### Prerequisite for Advanced Work

SOCW 2361, 2315 and 3301 or permission of instructor is required for all advanced work. An overall grade point average of 2.25 or higher is a prerequisite for admission into field instruction courses, SOCW 3098 and 4098. See individual course descriptions for additional prerequisite.

## Major in Sociology (Major Code: 122)

### University Core Curriculum Requirements

- SOCI 1301 is required for all advanced courses except SOCI 3311, 3342, 3094, 4321, 4325 and 4351.
