The Division of Nursing offers courses of study leading to the baccalaureate degree in nursing and the master's degree in nursing. Both programs are fully accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education and meet educational standards and requirements for the Board of Nurse Examiners for the state of Texas.

The undergraduate program prepares graduates for the practice of professional nursing in diverse health-care settings and with diverse populations. Graduates complete 126 semester hours of the prescribed curriculum for the bachelor of science in nursing degree. Upon successful completion of the program, graduates are eligible to take the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX-RN) for licensure as registered nurses. For persons who are licensed vocational nurses (LVNs), refer to the "Major in Nursing—For Licensed Vocational Nurses" section. For persons who are licensed as registered nurses in good standing, RN to B.S.N. (offered totally online—see this section) and RN to M.S.N. program options are available (see the graduate section).

The graduate program of study leads to the master of science degree in nursing with role specializations in education, administration and family nurse practitioner.

Located on the WTAMU campus, the Division of Nursing includes classrooms, laboratories, the Bivins Nursing Learning Center and faculty offices. Clinical experience is provided in health-care facilities in Amarillo, Canyon and surrounding areas.

- Eight hours from BIOL 2420 or 2572 with concurrent lab, BIOL 2402 with concurrent lab.
- PSYC 2301, 2314, SOCI 1301.
- Basic chemistry course (NSCI 1372, CHEM 1405 or 1411).

Admission Requirements for the Division of Nursing

- Formal application and admission to WTAMU (application fee required).
- A separate, competitive application process is required for admission into the Division of Nursing. Admission is required prior to 2000-level nursing courses for basic students and LVN degree-completion students, and prior to 3000-level nursing courses for RN degree-completion students. Current license to practice as LVN or RN is required for LVN and RN degree completion students requesting advanced standing (application fee required).
- Completion of the following courses: ENGL 1301 and 1302; basic chemistry course with lab, NSCI courses; PSYC 2301; BIOL 2401 with lab (four hours); MATH 1314 or 1324; and demonstrated computer competency prior to 2000-level nursing courses.
- Minimum grade point average of 2.5 and a minimum grade of "C" in biology, chemistry, psychology, sociology and mathematics courses.
- A transfer student must submit copies of all transcripts and if transferring from another school of nursing, recommendation letters from the dean and detailed descriptions of nursing courses. A maximum total of 66 semester hours may be transferred from community colleges attended.
- To be considered for admission, the following items must be submitted with the application: application fee, immunization records and all transcripts.
- Applications to the Division of Nursing should be submitted by Feb. 1 for fall semester admission and Sept. 1 for spring semester admission.

Division of Nursing

- All basic and LVN students are required to take a pre-admission exam.
- Upon admission to the nursing program, criminal background checks may be required.

Students may appeal Admissions Committee decisions, first to the committee and then to the head of the Division of Nursing. Exceptions, resulting in conditional admission, will be considered on an individual basis by the head of the Division of Nursing.

Advanced Standing

Registered nurses or others with previous experience and education in nursing must be admitted to the Division of Nursing through the same procedure as all students. Advanced standing will be determined after evaluation of transcripts. For further information, refer to “Advanced Placement and Credit by Examination” in this catalog.

Readmission to the Division of Nursing

Readmission to the Division of Nursing is not automatic. Students must reapply to the division after withdrawal or failure in any semester. Students who make grades of “D” or below three times in nursing courses will not be allowed to continue in the program. A student who leaves the program for any reason may be permitted to re-enroll based on (1) individual qualifications and (2) available space. The student’s record of dropped courses or withdrawals from the University will be considered. Satisfactory scores on comprehensive examinations covering nursing theory and clinical coursework previously completed will be required for basic students who have not been enrolled in nursing courses at WTAMU for five or more years.

Major in Nursing—For Basic and Transfer Students (Major Code: 701)

Transfer Students

Transfer students must:

- Be in good academic standing and eligible for readmission at the last nursing program attended.
- Provide documentation from the dean or appropriate division head of the last nursing program attended that states readmission eligibility and academic standing.
- Submit official transcripts from each institution attended to the Division of Nursing.

Senior College

Students transferring from a senior college into the basic nursing program must submit copies of nursing course syllabi. If the transferring courses are not over five years old, courses will be evaluated for transfer on an individual basis. If courses are greater than five years old, see “Returning Basic WTAMU Students and Transferring Basic Students” in this section.

Community College

Students transferring from a community college into the basic nursing program may transfer selected nursing courses after copies of all course syllabi have been submitted, reviewed and approved. If the transferring courses are not over five years old, courses will be evaluated for transfer on an individual basis. If courses are greater than five years old, see “Returning Basic WTAMU Students and Transferring Basic Students” in this section.

Returning Basic WTAMU Students and Transferring Basic Students

Any basic/traditional student, WTAMU or transferring, who has not been enrolled in clinical nursing courses in the past five years, must demonstrate competency by examination prior to being rescheduled into the nursing curriculum. A course-specific exam, which will be a standardized test, will be given. The exam may be taken one time. A fee is charged for each exam. If the student is unsuccessful, the student will be scheduled into that/those clinical course(s) as space is available. Registered Nurses

Before applying to the Division of Nursing, 57 hours of core curriculum and prerequisite semester hours must be completed. The applicant must be a licensed registered nurse in good standing upon admission to the nursing program; criminal background checks may be required. Credit for previous nursing coursework and practice knowledge will be held in escrow until successful completion of the final course in the RN degree completion program. Progression and Graduation

- A degree plan must be filed with the dean of the College of Agriculture, Nursing, Science and Engineering after 60 hours have been completed.
- A minimum grade of “C” must be maintained in all nursing, biology, chemistry, sociology, psychology and mathematics courses.
- A grade of “C” or above is required to pass a nursing course and progress through the curriculum on schedule. Progression will be determined on an individual basis for a student who earns a grade of “D” or below in a nursing course.
- Students are expected to attend all classes and clinical laboratories.
- Microbiology, nutrition and human development must be completed prior to entering 3000-level nursing courses.
- Students must pass a comprehensive exam after completion of all 2000-level nursing courses before progressing to 3000-level nursing courses and after completion of all 3000-level nursing courses before progressing to 4000-level nursing courses. Students who fail a leveling comprehensive examination twice will be required to repeat identified course on a space-available basis.
- Only 70 hours in the nursing major may be counted toward the B.S.N. degree.
- Of the final 30 hours toward a degree, 24 hours must be residence credit. (CLEP, Challenge and correspondence courses are not resident credit courses.) No more than 66 hours may be transferred from a junior college.
- Students must comply with all rules and policies as set forth in the *Division of Nursing Handbook* and in the *West Texas A&M University Code of Student Life*.
- Basic senior students must pass a comprehensive nursing examination prior to graduation. Students who do not pass the comprehensive exam must complete an individualized plan of study, which may include enrollment in additional courses, before graduation.
- Students who withdraw before the 12th class day (fourth class day for summer sessions) will have no record of the semester on their transcripts except a notation “Student withdrew without earning credit (date).” If a student withdraws before the end of the eighth week of a semester, the third week of a summer session or the mid-point of a specially scheduled course, the grade “X” (drop/withdraw passing) will be recorded on the transcript. If a student withdraws after that time, a grade of pass (“X”) or fail (“F”) is assigned for all courses that semester.
