Post-baccalaureate work in communication disorders leads to the required master of science degree. Post-baccalaureate work in communication and art lead to master of arts and master of fine arts degrees. The master of fine arts degree with a studio major is the required degree for teaching on the college/university level. The master of arts in communication degree provides a broad-based and flexible program of graduate study in the communicative arts.

Master of Arts (M.A.) Degree

Major in Art

M.A./M.F.A. Degree Requirements
 (See general and degree requirements below.)

NOTE: Graduate students in art may concentrate in the areas of painting, drawing, ceramics, metalsmithing/jewelry, printmaking, sculpture, glass, computer art, two-dimensional art, three-dimensional art and art education.

Program Application Requirements

For all graduate art programs, prospective students must apply to the University, apply to the Graduate School and then complete the following steps for art program approval:

- Submit a portfolio or a collection of 20 slides.
- Submit a one-page letter of intent or a one-page artistic statement.
- Interview with the major professor of the prospective student’s intended studio.

General Information About Graduate Student Status

Students accepted into the art graduate program will be admitted into the M.A. degree program. All graduate students are reviewed each semester and prior to submission of their individual plan of study. Semester reviews will determine whether an art graduate student will remain in the program and whether they will remain as a M.A. degree candidate or a M.F.A. degree candidate. (Consideration for candidacy is possible after completion of 24 hours.) All graduate students are required to work very closely with their major professor in order to schedule each semester's review, which will normally take place around Nov. 10 for the fall semester and April 10 for the spring semester.

For those graduate students who lack experience or the appropriate undergraduate degree, probationary status and leveling course work is available. Please consult with your studio professor about leveling requirements and probationary status as an art graduate student.

Standard Undergraduate Requirements

In addition to the entrance requirement established for all graduate students to be accepted to major in art, students must:

- For the 60-hour M.F.A. degree program, have been awarded a B.F.A. degree or equivalent with:
 - A minimum of 12 semester hours (18 semester hours for two- or three-dimensional option) of work in their intended major studio area of concentration.
 - Nine semester hours (15 semester hours for two- or three-dimensional option) in their intended additional studio area.
 - 12 semester hours of art history.
- For the 30-hour thesis program, have been awarded a baccalaureate degree with a major in art equivalent to that required in the undergraduate program at WTAMU.
- For the 36-hour non-thesis program, have been awarded a baccalaureate degree with a major in art equivalent to that required in the WTAMU undergraduate program.

Students must have completed at least nine semester hours in their intended major studio area of concentration and six semester hours in their intended additional studio area.

Degree Requirements

M.F.A. Degree in Studio Art (60 semester hours)

- 21 semester hours (27 semester hours for two- or three-dimensional option) in the major studio area of concentration, (including six semester hours in ARTS 7302, indicated below).
- 15 semester hours (18 semester hours for two- or three-dimensional option) in the additional studio area.
- 12 semester hours in art history, including ARTS 5370.
- 12 semester hours art electives (reduced for two- and/or three-dimensional option).
- 40 semester hours must be in 6000-level courses.
- Six semester hours ARTS 7302 (terminal project/thesis to include an oral examination, an exhibition of M.F.A. studio work featuring the M.F.A. project and an extensive professional paper).

Upon completion of 24 graduate art hours, the student may apply for admittance to the M.F.A. program by submitting a portfolio and written statement to the art graduate faculty outlining reasons for seeking the degree.

M.A. Degree (Thesis Program) (30 semester hours)

- 12 semester hours ARTS 6301, 6302; 5370, 6395 or 6397.
- 30 semester hours in art or 24 semester hours in art and six semester hours in approved additional courses.
- 18 semester hours must be 6000 level.

M.A. Degree (Non-Thesis Program) (36 semester hours)

- ARTS 5370 and 6395 or 6397.
- 15 semester hours (18 semester hours for two- or three-dimensional option) in major studio concentration area, including six semester hours of ARTS 6394.
- Nine semester hours (12 semester hours for two- or three-dimensional option) in an additional studio area.
- Six semester hours electives in art or approved additional courses (reduced for two- and/or three dimensional option).
- 21 semester hours must be 6000 level.
- ARTS 6394, M.A. Project (six semester hours) to fulfill the following requirements:
 - Faculty approved original studio project.
 - Written report supporting the studio project to demonstrate student's ability in independent research.
 - Presentation of work through a graduate exhibit.
 - An oral examination administered by the student's graduate committee.

NOTE: Up to 30 semester hours applied toward the non-thesis M.A. degree in art at WTAMU may also be used to fulfill M.F.A. degree requirements (except ARTS 6394—M.A. Project). Up to 20 semester hours applied to a M.A. degree at another institution may be applied to M.F.A. degree requirements.

Major in Communication (Major Code: 5205)

M.A. Degree Requirements

Admission Requirements

In addition to University requirements for graduate admission, the applicant must submit the following:

- Cover sheet that includes name, telephone number(s), e-mail address, mailing address and overall undergraduate GPA of the applicant.
- A one- to two-page, double-spaced, typed essay that includes discussion of:
 - What qualities or experiences has the applicant had that make the applicant a good candidate for graduate study?
 - Plans of the applicant for using the graduate communication degree.
 - Evidence of merit of the applicant (for example, GPA, communication internships, community service, membership in Lambda Pi Eta, etc.)
 - A photocopy of the applicant's Graduate Record Examination (GRE) scores.
- International students, before applying to the M.A. degree program in speech, must contact the WTAMU International Student Office at (806)651-2073 and inquire about both the application procedures and TOEFL exam policies/requirements.
- Photocopies of the applicant's transcripts from all colleges or universities attended. NOTE: The program requires 24 hours of undergraduate course work in communication or a closely related field. Students who do not have the 24 hours may be subject to a certain amount of leveling courses or be asked to provide evidence in support of a waiver of these requirements.
- At least one letter of recommendation from a faculty member, supervisor, etc.

Core (18 hours)

- SCOM 6315, 6350, 6380, 6381, 6382, 6320 or 6360.

M.A. Degree in Communication Emphases

Corporate Communication Emphasis

- Choose nine hours from SCOM 5341, 5345, 6310, 6331, 6332, 6355, 6384, 6385.
- Complete SCOM 6304—Research Project in Applied Communication.
- Choose six hours of SCOM electives from above list or from courses external to the communication program at the discretion of the graduate adviser.

Doctoral Preparation Emphasis

- 12 hours of electives selected in consultation with graduate adviser focused around a content area. Up to six of these 12 hours may be taken from other disciplines at the discretion of the student's adviser.
- Six hours of thesis (SCOM 6301 and 6302).
- Presentation/participation in at least one national/regional convention.

Mass Communication Emphasis

- Complete SCOM 6305, 6330 and 6304.
- Thesis Option: Choose three hours from SCOM 5341, 6310, 6330, 6340, 6395 and six hours of thesis (6301 and 6302 or 6303).
- Non-Thesis Option: Choose nine hours from SCOM 5341, 6310, 6330, 6340, 6383, 6395.

Performance Emphasis

- Choose 12 hours from SCOM 6306, 6310, 6385, 6398, 6388, 6399.
- Three hours of SCOM 6301 and three hours Performance Thesis (SCOM 6303).

Or choose six hours of SCOM electives (6000 level, approved by the graduate director) and 12 hours from THRE 6321, 6335, 6396. (Theatre classes may be repeated once.)

Degree Requirements

Plan I (Thesis)

- 30 semester hours of coursework plus six hours of thesis (SCOM 6301 and either 6302 or 6303).
- 21 of the 30 semester hours must be 6300 level and must include 6315, 6380, 6381.
- Students will present an oral defense of their theses to satisfy the comprehensive exam requirement.

Plan II (Non-Thesis)

- 36 semester hours, including the 18-hour core.
- 24 of the 36 semester hours must be at the 6300 level.
- Completion of SCOM 6304, including a public presentation of research results to satisfy the comprehensive exam requirement.

Department of Art, Communication and Theatre

Optional Minors

With approval of the graduate director, the student may elect a minor field of study for either plan consisting of a maximum of six semester hours.

Master of Fine Arts (M.F.A.) Degree

Major in Studio Art

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- For the 36-hour non-thesis program, have been awarded a baccalaureate degree with a major in art equivalent to that required in the WTAMU undergraduate program. Students must have completed at least nine semester hours in their intended major studio area of concentration and six semester hours in their intended additional studio area.

Master of Science (M.S.) Degree

Major in Communication Disorders

M.S. Degree Requirements (See requirements in the "Graduate School" section of this catalog.)

The WTAMU Communication Disorders Program is nationally accredited by the Council of Academic Accreditation in Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology of the American Speech-Language and Hearing Association (ASHA).

The primary goal of the master's degree program in communication disorders is to develop competent professional practitioners who are prepared to work with other disciplines and make contributions to the field of speech-language pathology and who are well grounded in diagnostic and therapeutic skills. Knowledge of and participation in research is strongly encouraged.

The length of the program may vary depending on the undergraduate background of the student; but the master's degree in communication disorders is available with a thesis or non-thesis option. In addition, enrollment in clinical practicum each semester is required in order to achieve a total of 400 clinic clock hours.

Department of Art, Communication and Theatre

Admission Requirements

In addition to University and Graduate School admission requirements, the program requires:

- A 500-word essay discussing personal and professional goals.
- Three letters of recommendation from undergraduate professors.
- Interview with the program director.

Ongoing Program Requirements

- Documentation required within the first two weeks of classes:
 - Documented copy of liability insurance.
 - Evidence of a current CPC card.
- Immunizations:
 - Required—tuberculosis.
 - Strongly recommended—rubella (women only) and hepatitis B.
- Courses with grades of “C,” “D,” “F,” “I” (incomplete), “IP” or “X” (drop or withdrawal) can not be used to satisfy requirements for graduate degree.

Completion/Graduation Requirements

- Take the Praxis NESPA specialty area exam. (ASHA examination; 600 or better is passing.)
- Students must demonstrate mastery of all learning outcomes that are part of the Formative and Summative Assessment of Knowledge and Skills Acquisition (FASA-KASA). The FASA-KASA learning outcomes are incorporated into and listed on the syllabi of each graduate course in communication disorders. This requirement helps meet standards of the Council of Academic Accreditation in Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association.

Thesis and Non-Thesis Options

The master of science degree in communication disorders includes two options.

Thesis Option (36 hours)*

- CD 6305, 6310, 6315, 6330, 6335, 6350, 6360, 6370, 6375, 6380.
- CD 6301, 6302 (thesis).
- CD 6398, 6399 (to satisfy 400 clinical clock hours).

Non-Thesis Option (42 hours)*

- CD 6305, 6310, 6315, 6325, 6330, 6335, 6350, 6360, 6370, 6375, 6380 and three hours from 6392 or PSYC 6300-level elective.
- CD 6398, 6399 (to satisfy 400 clinical clock hours).

*Additional hours may be required to meet ASHA requirements.
