The Symphonic Band is performing for the 10th time at TMEA this year. The concert is Thursday, Feb. 4 at 8:00 p.m. We're also doing another clinic, as we did last year, at 8:00 a.m. the next morning. The title of the clinic is "Rhythm, Pitch, and Style: The Big 3."

I'm sure there are many who'll be reading this from each of the previous TMEA bands in the years 1968, 1971, 1974, 1977, 1980, 1984, 1988, 1992, and 1996 and that all will remember the tremendous thrill and excitement that accompanies these events. You can be sure it's no different this year. With TMEA coming a week earlier than usual, we're feeling a lot of pressure to be ready, but this is a very talented group and I have no doubt that they'll represent us in a way that will make all of you proud.

We're playing a home concert on Saturday, Jan. 30 at 8:00 p.m., followed by a concert at the Amarillo Civic Center on Monday, Feb. I at 7:30 p.m. On the way to San Antonio we'll be playing at Coronado HS in Lubbock on Tuesday at 7:00 p.m., at Frenship HS the next morning at 8:45 a.m., at Lamesa HS at 11:30 a.m., and at Central HS in San Arigelo at 8:00 p.m. On the 4th, we'll be playing at Brady HS at 10:00 a.m., then on to San Antonio. We hope to see many of you along the way.

The program will feature a new commission by Bernard Hoffer, Morning in St. Lucia, an 18-minute work in three movements. Our soloist this year will be Doug Storey, our clarinet teacher, who will be performing the Bernstein Prelude, Fugue, and Riffs, conducted by Don Lefevre. The program will open with the Smetana "Overture" to The Bartered Bride and conclude with Elgar's Enigma Variations (take note, those who were in the '77 band!). See you in San Antonio.

Stanley Potter Retires

Mr. Stanley Potter retired on July 31 after more than 35 years of service to the music department and to the university. (By retiring in the middle of summer when no faculty are around and giving no advance warning, he was successfully able to avoid the lavish farewell party that we would have thrown, but which we now owe him.) Stanley began his tenure at WTAMU in 1962. He had received his bachelor's degree from the University of North Texas, a master's degree from Michigan State University, and had completed advanced course work at the University of Texas, Austin, A Fulbright Scholarship took him to Paris, France. For many years he participated in the Mu Phi Epsilon Recital Series in Dallas. He was quite active in the American Music Teachers Association and had often been sought for adjudication duties. He served on several important department committees, one of which was as coeditor of Ritornello. Our connection to the Far East was through Mr. Potter, who, because of his many contacts,

attracted talented students to his piano studio. He also patiently worked with these students to help them improve their language skills. His greatest legacy is the long list of students who have distinguished themselves in their own careers because of Stanley's influence and guidance. Best wishes for a long and prosperous retirement, Stanley.
