



With COVID-19 on everyone's mind, it's hard not to worry when you begin feeling symptoms of seasonal allergies.


The air is being filled with spring pollen and our seasonal allergies are kicking in. However, there is a difference between allergies and COVID-19 symptoms.

Dr. Donald R. Beerwinkle died Monday, March 16, 2020 in Lubbock, Texas. He was born October 7, 1939 in Bell County, Texas to Ruben and Esther (Haas) Beerwinkle. He married Pat Nickols in Pampa, Texas on July 10, 1964.

Dr. Beerwinkle taught at West Texas State University from 1964 until 1979.

He is remembered by former student, Dr. Bob Robinson, as a "legendary professor that cared deeply for his students."

#### What is the title of your research project?

"Evaluation of Behavioral Characteristics, Feeding Performance, and Carcass Quality Attributes of Serial Slaughtered British x Continental Steers among Various Marketing Endpoints Evaluating E2+TBA Implant Treatment vs Non-Implanted Controls"

#### Who is involved?

#### Description of Research Project

This research documents composition of gain of finishing cattle from 600 to 2000 pounds, with and without growth promoting implant technology.

#### Why is this type of Research is important for this region?

This research will allow the cattle feeding community to understand where nutrients are deposited for each unit of feed consumed, and how those deposition sites change throughout the feeding period.

#### **Expected Publication of the Research Results**

Thirteen abstracts and thirteen peer-reviewed publications will be submitted to journals for dissemination of results.






