Guidelines for Formatting the Empirical Research Scholarly Deliverable

In partial fulfillment of the Scholarly Delivery requirement of the WTAMU Ed.D. program in Educational Leadership, under the guidance and direction of their scholarly delivery committees, doctoral candidates must engage in their own empirical research that culminates in a publishworthy manuscript formatted for submission to the Educational Administration Quarterly (EAQ). The EAQ is a noted and respected journal of the University Council for Educational Administration (UCEA) that publishes prominent empirical and conceptual articles focused on timely and critical leadership and policy issues of educational organizations.

General Submission Guidelines

The EAQ general manuscript submission guidelines are as follow:

- ✓ 25 to 40 pages in length, inclusive of references, tables, and figures
 With the limited number of pages allowed, journal white space is precious. Conciseness
 and clarity are of the utmost importance (see Section 4.4 of the APA manual). Every
 single word must pull its weight!
- ✓ Follow 7th ed. APA style, including organization of structure, reference formatting, table and figure formatting, in-text citing, etc.
- ✓ Typed, double spaced, Times New Roman 12-point font

Note: The Graduate School requires two deviations from 7th ed. APA style formatting. First, the left-hand margin must be set at 1-1/2 inches for binding purposes. Due to this requirement, the empirical scholarly deliverable *may be up to 48 pages in length*. Second, the page numbers must be in the bottom center of each page footer.

Reporting Standards

For empirical submissions, EAQ directs researchers to employ the American Educational Research Association's (AERA) <u>Standards for Reporting on Empirical Social Science Research</u> and the American Psychological Association's (APA) <u>Reporting Standards for Research in Psychology</u> (also located in the JARS section of the 7th ed. APA manual).

Organizational Structure

Although most professional journals abide by the 7th ed. APA organizational structure of manuscripts, many often have minor deviations specific to the journal. Journal specifications in structure and format will always trump APA or any other professional formatting guidance. In some instances, EAQ requires minor deviations from the standard APA structure. Moreover, the WTAMU Graduate School also requires minor deviations (as addressed in the note in the General Submission Guidelines section). Consequently, the organizational structure of your final manuscript, suitable for the final scholarly delivery submission to the Graduate School, is

expected to be formatted accordingly. Since EAQ requires authors to abide by AERA and APA reporting standards, references are provided via hyperlink to justify guidance for the organizational structure of your manuscript in accordance with the methodological approach to your study as organized in the tables that follow. The major levels of manuscript organization, pursuant to APA requirements, following the title page, are Introduction, Method, Results, and Discussion.

Title Page

The basic format and subheadings for title pages are outlined in the table that follows for the three methodological approaches.

Introduction

Introduce your work in three to five paragraphs to orient the reader to the research and to place some parameters around the work that you have designed. These paragraphs should quickly lead into the applicable subheadings in the table that follows.

Method

Introduce the method section with a brief description of the path from the problem and/or RQ statement, purpose, relevant scholarship, and broad description of participants that leads to the research design selection and description – starting broadly (e.g., quantitative, qualitative, mixed methods) and narrowing in more tightly on the actual design (e.g., descriptive, causal-comparative, correlational, phenomenology, case study, grounded theory, ethnography, etc.). Justify why the method selected is appropriate to the problem or research question(s). Describe your method in explicit detail – to the level that another researcher could use it as an instructional guide to replicate your research.

Stick to the presentations of unbiased findings only and save the interpretation for the discussion section.

A clear logic of inquiry connects the research problem, research questions, hypotheses, relevant literature, demographic information, presentation and interpretation of outcomes, new knowledge and understandings gained, and implications for further research, policy, theory, and/or practical applications.
