A maximum of 60 semester hours in communication studies (COMM), six hours in religion (REL) and six hours in physical education (PHED) can be counted toward a degree.

Prerequisites/Important Sequences/Other Degree Notes: Follow the education sequence of classes as listed above. During the first semester of the senior year, students are expected to participate in paid substitute teaching one day each week. In their junior year, second semester, students must complete 40 hours of observation and take the practice content test. No additional course work may be taken the semester a student enrolls in student teaching. Speech certification majors will complete the COMM portfolio assignment their senior year and should plan to take the capstone course (COMM 4301) during the fall of their senior year.
